If you haven't yet seen the new renovations at the TCC Arena, take a look!







There were 4,924 fixed seats replaced, 2,122 portable chairs replaced, 990 lights replaced, 35,000sf of floor cleaned, 17,300sf of epoxy flooring applied, 14 restrooms renovated equaling 8,500sf. 58,000sf of ceilings replaced and painted, 1,800 gallons of surface repainted, 357 new signs, 354 door tags, 164 painted signs, 2 LED HD Video Board and 21 other video boards were installed, and a partridge in a pear tree! Ok, minus the partridge in a pear tree, but that is a lot of work done in 296 calendar days with 146 days of construction. Not bad considering how much better it all looks now! So the next time you go to the TCC Arena, make sure to check out all these great improvements, and enjoy your event!

Almost Free Trees

Need a tree? The Trees for Tucson program is now open for requests for low-cost trees for home delivery in the popular spring planting period. To qualify for low-cost home shade trees, residents must be in the Tucson Electric Power Co. or Trico Electric Cooperative electric service area, and AGREE to plant the trees within 15 feet of the west, south or east side of the home.

Tucson Electric Power customers may order trees for \$8 each, available for purchase online at www.treesfortucson.org or call (520) 837-6835 to receive a mailed or faxed form. If you happen to have or know anyone who has Trico Electric Cooperative members may request trees at a cost of \$15 each (billed to their Trico utility account), online at www.trico.coop or call (520) 744-2944, extension 1605 for ordering assistance.

Electronics and Recycling Collection event on Monday, January 19th, from 9am-2pm at Desert Metals Recycling (3119 E. Pennsylvania St.). This event will accept working and non-working electronics from area residents including computers, printers and other peripheral items, printer cartridges, cell phones and other small household electronics (i.e., fans, mixers, toasters, vacuums), home entertainment equipment, telephones and other electronic components. Most electronics recycled at no cost. Televisions and monitors are NOT accepted.

Printer cartridges will be recycled through Cartridge World Tucson to benefit Tucson Clean & Beautiful, and cell phones will be provided to Emerge! Center Against Domestic Abuse for reuse or recycling.

A total of 618,482 guests visited Reid Park Zoo during the 2014 calendar year, representing an increase of 11.9% from 2013, and the highest attendance in the Zoo's history. December 2014 was the most attended month ever, with 82,595 guests visiting.

In the next year, the Zoo is planning on adding several new features including a gibbon habitat that will allow guests the opportunity to view these agile apes at several different angles. In addition, the Reid Park Zoological Society is currently raising funds to build a wildlife carousel that will feature 30 exotic animals in an African-themed pavilion. The Zoological Society is currently welcoming sponsors for the individual carousel animals.

The Zoo is home to a diverse collection of over 400 animals, many of which are rare or endangered, so make sure you check out all of them! Also, check out their website, www.reidparkzoo.org for fun events happening at the Zoo!



County Road Update by Rick Ellis

Valencia Road, Alvernon to Wilmot

Pima County Department of Transportation (PCDOT), in cooperation with the City of Tucson and Regional Transportation Authority (RTA), is currently managing the reconstruction of Valencia Road from Alvernon Way to Wilmot Road. This project consists of widening Valencia from four lanes to six lanes between Alvernon and Wilmot (including widening the bridge over the Union Pacific Railroad, UPRR), and is part of the RTA's Transportation Plan1 approved by voters in 2006.

Construction efforts are ongoing throughout the corridor with work activities proceeding in an east to west direction. Motorists are using the southern half of the roadway from Wilmot to the vicinity of the bridge over the UPRR. Just west of the bridge, the traffic flow switches to the north half of the road and continues on that side until Alvernon. Activities throughout the corridor consists of concrete work occurring on the bridge over the UPRR, plus paving, grading and signal work occurring in the vanity of the Littletown intersection and continuing through the I-10 interchange. West of I-10, grading and drainage activities are nearing completion, and preparation activities for asphalt paving will be starting in the upcoming weeks. Lastly, the construction of a new access road and drainage work activities at Desert View High School are ongoing.


Beat Back Buffelgrass
