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for the next fiscal year for us, and we're still

being very conservative about our revenue. 2

We can confirm that we will not 3 participate directly in the American Rescue Plan.

We were hopeful that we might be a direct recipient,

but -- and Senator Kelly's office worked very hard

on our behalf, but we have been advised we're not

directly eligible. 8

But we still may see some pass-through 9 funds from either the City, County, or State. You 10 won't see any of that in our budget. We're not 11 anticipating anything like that. So we're budgeting 12 basically for our portion of sales tax and other 13 revenue. 14

15 If you've been downtown lately, it's quite remarkably different than it was this time a year ago. Our restaurant sector has been very busy, 17 a lot of pedestrian traffic.

Of course, the arena is back in business 19 with hockey and indoor football. And we're pleased 20 to say that the concerts begin back at the arena in 21 September. 22

In fact, Jackson Browne tickets go on sale tomorrow for the music hall. He'll be at the TCC, I think, on September 15th.

budget-wise. We're kind of slowly coming back to our former level of expenses. We'll go through that in great detail here in a minute.

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4 So, Dan, if you want to do your financial update, then we'll move on to the budget hearing.

MR. MEYERS: Okay. This is Dan Meyers. 6 7 I'm the CFO here at Rio Nuevo.

So this document we're looking at here is our monthly cash balance report. It shows cash balances on hand as of May 31st. You'll see we've got about \$4 million in the bank at the end of May.

Some of that stuff was committed for some 12 payments that are made shortly end of the month, leaving about \$2.6 million in the bank, but we were still waiting about \$2 million for a reimbursement for TCC construction funds that we get reimbursed

So, actually, our cash balance at the end of May was about 4.7 million.

Got some really good news today, I think. And we just -- I just got the detail 10 minutes ago, so I haven't really looked at it. But we're going to get \$1.3 million and a little change for the month of April.

I don't know what that consists of

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Moreover, we're seeing some real interesting activity from the Fox and Rialto.

Remember, they've been dark now for over a year, and

we were really concerned about both of those

theaters not being able to survive. 5

We've done our part. The City has helped 6 us with some relief funds as well. And, of course, 7 the PPP and the, you know, Stages Act, I think, 9 helped save those venues.

Cathy Rivers, as you've probably read, is 10 the new CEO at the Rialto, and you're going to begin 11 seeing activity from them in September with Neko 12 Case, and Mr. Irvin's favorite band, The Flaming 13 Lips, will be back at the Rialto. 14

Bonnie is in town from the Fox, and they 15 have a great lineup. They just announced that a few 16 days ago. But unbelievable lineup at the Fox, with 17 Chris Isaak, Pat Metheny, Asleep At The Wheel, Amy Grant, Lindsey Buckingham, Robert Cray Band, Béla 19 Fleck, Don McLean, et cetera. 20

So we're just really excited to see our 21 entertainment venues come back, and we know that's 22 23 been the lifeblood of our downtown.

So we're optimistic today that we'll have 24 a decent year. You won't see us getting too silly entirely. I think we've got some amendments coming

through, but that's the biggest month we've had in a

while. Last month was a little over a million, so

certainly we're on the upwards trend.

You look down towards the bottom of the page, and you'll see our commitments. Left-hand column shows what the original commitment was, or even updated commitment. Middle column shows how much of that has been spent. And the right column shows what remains on those commitments.

You'll see two of them particularly highlighted. Those will not be paid within the next year, most likely -- or certainly. So we've got about \$3.5 million sitting here in commitments, and we got 4.7 in the bank. So we've still got about a million two sitting there to be utilized.

Does anybody have any questions on the monthly cash balance report?

MR. SHEAFE: Just to make the point, Dan, the commitments are timed out throughout what date? Because we have other commitments that are beyond that date.

23 **MR. MEYERS:** Yeah, the commitments in that right column, with the exception of the two that are highlighted, those -- we all kind of expect

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those to come through within the next year.

MR. SHEAFE: The next year going through 2 the date, define that in terms of a month. 3

4 **MR. MEYERS:** May 31, 2022.

MR. SHEAFE: We took everything that we 5 didn't believe we would have to fund between now and May 31st and pushed that beyond, then those numbers

are not accounted for, but they're still 8

9 commitments.

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CHAIRMAN McCUSKER: The big one there --10 the big is the \$3 million for 75 East Broadway. 11

12 That's probably the one commitment that we've made 13

that's probably not due for a couple years.

MR. SHEAFE: That's one of the biggest 14 15 ones.

MR. MEYERS: And the Southern

New Hampshire University, that's an annual payment. 17

So that's why those two are highlighted. You can

see them, you know, second line from the bottom,

less deferred long term that are backed out to show 20

our net -- what we anticipate our net commitments 21

within the next year are going to be. 22

MR. SHEAFE: Right.

MS. COX: I mean, and what about 24

100 South Church: what is that?

CHAIRMAN McCUSKER: Okay. So this is the

time annually set aside for our budget hearing. We

do invite the public to comment. We did that this

year, since we're virtual, by e-mail. And we've had

no requests for comments.

So I would need a motion to call the --6 or, Mr. Collins, I just call the hearing to order, 7

or do I need a motion? 8

MR. COLLINS: No, you can do it yourself. CHAIRMAN McCUSKER: All right. So I will call the hearing -- budget hearing for the fiscal year ending June 30, '22, to order.

12 And, Dan, if you want to go ahead and 13 present your draft budget.

MR. MEYERS: All right. So this has been submitted to the board, and I've had some comments and questions from most of you.

So I would just like to take some time to go through this almost line by line, and we can talk about them.

But -- so the projected revenue, just for your information, I anticipate it to come in right around \$9 million for 2021, this fiscal year.

We know what we've gotten through April, and we've got May and June, which we won't -- it

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CHAIRMAN McCUSKER: That's Farhang & 1 Medcoff's new building. We've committed to some parking subsidies for them. 3

MR. SHEAFE: And that's moving forward.

Mark Irvin has the best time line on that, but I

6 believe they're going to be moving into that office 7 space --

CHAIRMAN McCUSKER: They're in it. 8 9 **MR. IRVIN:** They've been in for probably,

on a temporary C of O, for two months. 10 11

MR. SHEAFE: Okay.

CHAIRMAN McCUSKER: And I do believe we 12 approved some parking subsidies for them some time 13

ago, right, Mr. Collins? 14

MR. COLLINS: That's correct, Your 15 Honor -- or Mr. --16

CHAIRMAN McCUSKER: I like that, 17 "Your Honor." 18

MR. COLLINS: Old habits die hard. 19

CHAIRMAN McCUSKER: Well deserved, in my 20 opinion. 21

Any other question -- any other questions 22 23 for Dan?

MR. SHEAFE: So we should jump now to the 24

25 budget? takes two months to find out, so that's estimating,

I think, \$800,000 a month for the next two months.

So -- so this -- for next fiscal year I'm 3

expecting -- or projecting 11.25 million. You can

see I started \$800,000 and basically increased it \$25,000 a month.

I'm hoping that is short and that these

numbers increase by maybe \$50,000 a month, if not

9 more. But I think until we really see the trends,

even before I take the time to analyze April, I'm 10

hesitant to be much more of -- optimistic than this. 11

The next line shows special events. 12 Those are things held at the TCC. And after

speaking to the general manager there, he's

expecting two events, and typically bring in a couple hundred thousand dollars each. 16

Brandi has worked like crazy on tracking 17 down vendors who have not filed their TPT returns 18 properly, and I'm anticipating \$500,000 in 19

amendments that we're pretty much aware of. 20 Now, some of that may have snuck 21

through this month. I'm not sure yet. So -- but 22 23 I think that \$500,000 is probably safe for the 24

Hopefully that's low, because just

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today Brandi ran across something we think we may

be able to free up some funds for. So kudos for 2

Brandi for constantly working, chasing down these 3

4 merchants. She does a terrific job.

Interest income, you can see it dropping 5 monthly. That money is pretty much the money 6

sitting in the TCC improvement fund, and, you 7 8

know, we're eating into that every single month.

We get a small fee from Caterpillar 9 back when the original transactions took place. 10 So that's seventeen-five a year. 11

And then we've got rental income, 12 which is almost primarily now the Greyhound 13 facility. 14

So that's my estimate of what our income is going to be for the next fiscal year.

Any questions --

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CHAIRMAN McCUSKER: You might remind everybody how the base works, because, again, if you're not a Rio Nuevo loyalist, we participate in geography sales tax, but only if it exceeds the 1999 base, which was the year that Rio Nuevo was formed.

So part of the struggle we had last year, there were actually months, right, Dan, where we didn't even hit the 99 base, so everything you show these quickly.

2 So the 2221 East Broadway, the properties we own on Sunshine Mile that we constantly have to 3

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pay utilities on and pay for the homeless people

that bang things up and fixing and stuff like that.

Occupancy costs are our costs here to be 6 7 in our 1703 building.

Liability insurance, that includes

directors and officers. 9

Advertising and marketing, I mean, we've 10 just kind of -- we haven't been doing much, but 11 we've got some ongoing costs. And that's kind of in there in case something happens, and we -- you know, we decide we want to fund an event, or whatever we feel like doing as far as marketing and advertising 15 expense. 16

Project costs, those are little -- you know, that's kind of in there in case we find some little project we want to help out.

The thing we're doing the most right now, which is a separate line item, is the Sunshine Mile, but that's coming to an end. But we've kept something in there just in case we find a project that we really need to help out.

CFO, that guy is highly overpaid, and we

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as revenue now assumes that that's revenue above the 99 base? 2

MR. MEYERS: Correct. Yeah, the only 3 ones we had last year we had zero were December, which is normally a big number, so that was a pretty 6 devastating blow. 7

Yeah, and the base jumps around significantly, so, you know, it's hard to really accurately predict. And then it also takes one merchant filing incorrectly to skew these numbers as 10

well. 11 So we know -- over the past five years, I 12

think we've done a good job of smoothing this out 13 because of our tracking ability and Brandi staying 14 on top of people, but -- so this -- you know, there's going to be some variety in there, but --16

CHAIRMAN McCUSKER: What was our 17 pre-COVID year revenue before --18

19 **MR. MEYERS:** I think we've been getting 20 close to 16 million, because --

CHAIRMAN McCUSKER: That's --21 MR. MEYERS: -- 3 million a month, which 22 23 is fifteen-six.

CHAIRMAN McCUSKER: Okay. Go ahead. MR. MEYERS: Okay. So we'll just go down should probably move to the next line.

Payroll, again, that's our Rio Nuevo payroll and benefits package.

Legal, we'll skip right over that one as 4 well. 5

6 I think that's a pretty good number. I 7 mean, Mark's done a ton of stuff for us, and some of these projects he gets involved in drag on for ages, and I'm sure he would vouch for that.

And our legislative representative, 10 that's pretty much the same from year to year for a fixed fee. 12

Other professional would include our 13 audit, which will be getting started here probably in the next month or so.

IT cost, which you know how that's always 16 something we need to deal with, and then any other 17 things that may pop up. There's probably a little bit of extra room in that account. 19

And our bid tax is what we pay primarily for the TCC, and I believe that goes to the Downtown Tucson Partnership for all they do downtown.

23 And then just general office expense --MS. HAGA-BLACKMAN: Paper clips. 24 MR. MEYERS: -- office supplies, paper 25

1 clips, rubber bands, for a thousand dollars a month.

So we see our operating costs to be somewhere in the

vicinity of 1.4 million.

4 Okay. So then here comes our big ones, our guest service, which is close to \$750,000 a

month. That's to BBVA and Bank of Oklahoma. And

then we've got our annual payments for the Greyhound

financing, which is an interest payment in January 8

9 and a principal and interest in July.

Okay. Then we go down to the project 10 costs, which we pretty much already went over with 11 12 the other cash balance reports.

But my estimate is with Sunshine Mile 13 we've got about \$40,000 left to spend. This thing 14 just keeps -- again, keeps dragging on and more fees 15 and more signs and more this and more that. 16

But I think -- Fletcher, I think you 17 mentioned we should be coming to the end of this? 18

CHAIRMAN McCUSKER: It's on the city 19 council agenda for July 7th, so we're just a few 20 weeks way from the final approval. 21

MR. MEYERS: And I'll tell you what's 22 become a real problem in many ways, is the vagrants and the homeless just constantly breaking into the buildings and putting graffiti on them. I mean,

the City. You may remember, we were on the hook

there, I think, for about \$2.1 million in our

original commitment.

4 There's a small gap still, but that's now been reduced to \$400,000. The project is the same.

It produces a lot of sales tax. It's a really

valuable project. 7

So we've penciled that in. We don't need 8 to pay that, I understand, until the end of the calendar year. But we've kept that project live, as 10 we have with the other two Broadway projects. 11

Both Rocco's and Lerua's are alive 12 subject to the overlay being approved here in a few 13 days. And then we can move pretty aggressively on those other two projects. 15 16

MR. SHEAFE: You know, right at the end there, 630, we have the 400,000 in there. Should we leave that or -- yeah.

CHAIRMAN McCUSKER: Yeah, it's going to 19 be due the end of the calendar year, so I think it's 20 21 appropriately budgeted.

MR. SHEAFE: So we should really move 22 23 that back, Dan, to December of '21.

MR. COLLINS: Right. 24

MR. MEYERS: Yeah, this is more of an

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Brandi deals with that every single day. 1

CHAIRMAN McCUSKER: Yeah. We may want to talk about that and put some money in the budget for enhanced security. Even as we privatize those, it's

still months away. And, you know, we'll come back 5 6

to that one when you're finished.

MR. MEYERS: Okay. Yeah, because we've 7 tried a lot of things, and none of them have been 8 9 successful.

Okay. And then we've got the Hexagon 10 parking assistance. 11

Blanco was something that was on our 12 budget, but I believe that's fallen off now. 13

123 North Stone, that was a commitment we 14 made, and we turned it into a note, and that's \$200,000. I'm not sure of the timing of that. 16

I don't know if Collins might have 17 something to chime in on that? 18

MR. COLLINS: At this point, I don't. 19

MR. MEYERS: Okay. So it's in the budget 20 for next year, just in case. 21

Fletcher, do you want to say anything 22 23 about the Volvo site?

CHAIRMAN McCUSKER: Yeah. So the 24 developer has renegotiated the purchase terms with annual budget. I just broke them out by months so we could see some things.

But, yeah, I can certainly -- when I do

my monthly projections, Chris, that you and I go over, I will put that back into the December 5

column.

7 MR. SHEAFE: Okay. Well, thank you, you know, because it is (Inaudible). 8

9 MR. MEYERS: Yeah. Okay. So we talked about Rocco's and Lerua's. My understanding is that 10 Empire has kind of hit -- been halted or hit a 11 block? 12

CHAIRMAN McCUSKER: We've had no ongoing discussions, right, Mr. Irvin, with them regarding kind of the previous conversations, so they would have to come back to us?

MR. IRVIN: The bank is waiting on them 17 to do some stuff, and they've been after them for some time, and it hasn't occurred. So we've driven them crazy to their stuff in, so until they do, 20 we've kind of got our hands tied. 21

MR. SHEAFE: Well, we just stuck it out 22 23 there. Mark, to -- as far as we could to make sure we didn't lose sight of it. 24

And I'm hoping that Lerua's will be able

CHAIRMAN McCUSKER: There are a lot of

5 issues there. Zoning is a part of that, because

they can't fit into the current zoning, Chris, so

they're also dependent on the overlay, and we're

8 working through that.

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9 Mr. Collins had a conference call with 10 them this week, and everyone is waiting on the 11 zoning.

CHAIRMAN McCUSKER: And El Presidio, Dan,

2 has started to draw, right? They've started

3 their --

MR. MEYERS: That's a \$450,000

commitment. We paid a bunch of architecture fees,

and I think there's now been an agreement from

7 some -- the cost of doing actual renovation.

How quickly that goes, I don't know, but
I've got it budgeted this year. People told me it's
going to be a fast mover once it gets going. So,

11 anyway, it's all in there.

SNHU parking, that was one that we got -it's a five-year installment, so that's our

14 installment for this year.

Television assistance, I don't know where we stand on that, but --

17 CHAIRMAN McCUSKER: I can give you a
18 quick update on that. I think that's a hard number
19 from our perspective. We have been able to help put

together a syndicate of our government colleagues tosupport that effort.

The City approved their portion. Visit Tucson has a significant stipend now in their

budget, and the State has an amount in their budget,

s which was approved by the Senate this week and goes

CHAIRMAN McCUSKER: -- Chris, because I

think we initially approved a hundred for the

3 outdoor dining. We only had 70,000 in requests.

4 But that would give us a little room in case

5 somebody else wants to come in.

I think you're right about Reilly's; that was the hundred.

MR. MARQUEZ: When Reilly's was part of the proceeds from the land that we sold, the fact we haven't paid the money, that's why it's showing up in the budget again?

MR. MEYERS: Yeah, we got to put it out at some point in time.

MR. MARQUEZ: And this is a (Inaudible)budget, so we got to pay it out.

CHAIRMAN McCUSKER: So that money from -we did close on the land sale, and that would go into the reserve, our cash on hand items now that would become a source of revenue for next year.

MR. MARQUEZ: Okay.

MR. MEYERS: Yeah, that money is in the bank already. So now we've got to spend it, so it's got to go in our budget to go out.

Okay. Now --

CHAIRMAN McCUSKER: Same thing would be

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1 true of the Hotel Congress, Item Number 50. That was approved subject to that sale, and we did close on that sale. 3 4 **MR. MEYERS:** Right. 5

Now, I don't know why, but that 100 South Church is in there for 40,000.

Do you remember the number on that? Was it 40, or was it 100? 8

MR. COLLINS: That's the Farhang & 9 Medcoff. 10

MR. IRVIN: Medcoff. 11

12 **CHAIRMAN McCUSKER:** That's the parking subsidy, which I --13

(Various people speaking.) 14

MR. MEYERS: Number 40, it seems like I 15

pulled that off a document, so --16

CHAIRMAN McCUSKER: I think it's higher 17 than that. I do think it's closer to a hundred. 18 We're subsidizing 10 parking spaces at 70 bucks a 19

month. Dan. What's that worth? 20

MR. COLLINS: It shouldn't be 70. 21

Mr. Chairman. It's either 50 or 60, depending 22

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CHAIRMAN McCUSKER: So let's say it's 60. 24

It's 600 a month --

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2 CHAIRMAN McCUSKER: Okay. So this is not the entire request. This is exactly what you did 3

4 with Reilly. This is the 300 that we've approved.

We just haven't spent any of it yet. So you've put

it in the budget. 6

(Various people speaking.)

CHAIRMAN McCUSKER: All right. So it 8 begs the question if we want to budget for the other half of their request, which would be another 300.

So put a little asterisk there, and we'll come back to that.

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MR. MEYERS: Okay.

MS. COX: They have not -- they seem 14 pretty pleased with the -- with our doing half. 15

CHAIRMAN McCUSKER: They've reached out about the second half.

MR. SHEAFE: The advantage, if we were to lock them in to the longer term, then they could get the ballroom converted and do the commercial spaces up front.

And that's to our advantage, because the original was really more towards the rear and taking care of their water problem and their other, you know, infrastructure problems that wouldn't be

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MR. COLLINS: Right. 1

CHAIRMAN McCUSKER: -- times --2

MR. MEYERS: I saw a document, I think, 3

earlier this week. I thought the number was 40. 4

Let me check on that, though. I'll verify that, 5

6 because that's in there.

Okay. Hotel Congress for 300,000.

And then we were going to put some air 8 conditioning in here in this office so we can hear.

9 CHAIRMAN McCUSKER: Let's talk about that

10 for a moment, because we deferred the back half of 11 their request. You'll remember, they asked for 600. 12

We approved 300. 13

So if we approve this budget, we're, in 14 effect, approving the back half of the Hotel 15 Congress request. I just want to make sure you're 16 all aware of that. 17

MS. COX: Wait a second. That means we're approving a total amount of \$600,000?

CHAIRMAN McCUSKER: Correct.

Right, Dan? That's the way I understand 21 22 this.

MR. MEYERS: Well, that's going to be 23 paid -- if that's going to be coming up in this next

fiscal year, that number should be revised to 600

evident. So that last payment buys a lot of return. 2

MS. COX: However, when we talked to 3

them, and then later when we talked to others about the fact that we aren't doing the entire amount, and 5

we told Zack that we would do just what we did for

Hotel Congress, half of their costs, and now --7 **CHAIRMAN McCUSKER:** So they have a 8

Robert's Rules of Order moment here, Mr. Collins, because Jannie is right; the only thing the board

has approved is the first half of the Hotel Congress

request, \$300,000, which Dan has appropriately 12 budgeted for. 13

So I might have the cart before the horse 14 trying to address it as a budget item when the board really hasn't approved the other 300,000. 16

MR. SHEAFE: I agree.

MR. COLLINS: Mr. Chairman, fortunately, 18 we haven't adopted Robert's Rules of Order, but I 19 do -- I concur with your position. 20

CHAIRMAN McCUSKER: So, Dan, if you'll clarify, this is the \$300,000 that we've already 22 23 approved, and the funding, in fact, is in the bank as we closed on the sale of that lot. We're not approving any new funds for either Reilly or Hotel

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Congress.

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MS. COX: Good. 2

MR. SHEAFE: Thanks for the

4 clarification, because I jumped ahead. I just know

where this is going.

CHAIRMAN McCUSKER: Yeah, I misunderstood 6 it, too, Chris. 7

So go ahead, Dan, Item 51.

MR. MEYERS: We've got our nice office 9 here, here that -- we got air conditioners that 10

sound like a jet plane is in here and not very 11

efficient, so we're going to get those -- something 12 modern in here. 13

We're also going to improve our fencing 14 and then provide an area where we can actually park 15 behind the building a little more securely. 16

So we've got a budget of \$20,000 to do 17 that. And that should start here relatively soon. 18

And we collected some sales tax from the Bautista 19

that we were still hanging on to. 20

MR. SHEAFE: Well, you know, we're going to hear about this in a few days, so we'll just 22

defer. But I think you might just leave the number

in there for right now. You've got it plugged way

down. And that story is going to tell a little

approximately 15 million for the next year and

compared to the input -- inflow of 12.3 million.

So I'm projecting a deficit, and, again, 3

this is what I think is pretty modest revenues, but

a deficit of \$2.6 million after we fund our

projects --6

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MR. SHEAFE: Let me just say for everybody's benefit, you know, budgets are totally dependent on assumptions. So you make assumptions,

and then you use your best estimates and best

11 numbers.

12 So Dan and I sat down and put a fair amount of time into trying to look at the revenue 13 stream and how much do we buy in to the improved conditions, and we sort of had a worst-case, 15 normal-case, and best-case review. 16

And then we just took the standard or mid 17 number and said, "Okay. That's what we're going to 18 put in for our revenue, and we'll try and fit what we're doing into that box." 20

And two things helped us, and one of them was to take some of the expenses and push them beyond the year so we didn't have to deal with them. And then we came up with -- or Dan came up with this estimate.

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different. It will come in a little different over the next few weeks.

MR. MEYERS: Well, one way or another, we 3 need to receive the money. So actually received that money, so we're either going to have to pay the 6 State, I would assume, or pay it back. So that's why it's in there. 7

MR. SHEAFE: All right.

9 **MR. MEYERS:** And then we need to pay a couple hundred thousand dollars for the TCC for subsidies and events down there, and we spent, I think, 30,000 so far, so there's 170 possible out 12 there that we could have to come up with. 13

MR. SHEAFE: Now, you have the 14 description sales tax due for Bautista twice. I assume that's --16

MR. MEYERS: Yeah, I was hoping you 17 wouldn't notice that. 18

MR. SHEAFE: It's all right. No big 19 20 thing.

MR. MEYERS: Yeah, I think I might have 21 22 moved something out of alignment.

23 So, anyway, the projects that I'm kind of anticipating having to spend for the next year is a

little over 4.2 million with a total outflow of

Basically, in my mind, this is about a 90-day budget. After 90 days, we'll recast all of this and figure out where some of the weaknesses in the assumptions are and adjust those.

And, hopefully, by that time, if the 5 revenue stream has proven to be growing from basic sales tax revenues that are being generated by businesses that are reopening and events at the TCC and hotels that are coming on and whatnot, you know, 10 that will be extremely beneficial to us.

One of the biggest areas that we have of opportunity are TCC events. If we do five car shows there versus two, that's a very big number that would be added to our budget.

So as we look at this, and you can pick 15 apart some of the numbers, what we're trying to do is use it to give us a safe number that we can deal 17 with. 18

19 We're still out of money. We're projecting a negative, so we can't go out and just start taking on other obligations. And I really appreciate the cooperation from the other board 23 members and our chairman in working within this framework. 24

We're trying to be as liberal as

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possible, because, frankly, our job is to get things done, not just sit here.

Dan and Brandi both have done a lot of 3 work, and Brandi has done such a good job reaching out to generate revenue streams that we might not have found. 6

And so all and all, I think we're in a good position with this budget to at least buy some 8 time and get by the next 90 days.

CHAIRMAN McCUSKER: Brandi, will you put the budget screen back up? 11

A couple things I'd like to revisit, 12 there's nothing in there for staff raises. I think 13 we should talk about that. 14

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The State has given their staff a 15 3 percent raise. I do think we need to talk about 16 some additional security, graffiti abatement, 17 whatever, along the Sunshine Mile. 18

As those buildings sit vacant, they're 19 attracting a lot of nuisance characters. And we 20 probably need to step up maybe some more active 21 22

23 It will take months before those are privatized. You know, I don't remember seeing a number. I don't know what line item, Dan, that

MS. HAGA-BLACKMAN: I have a note to reach out to our security company to see if they can even do that, or reach out to somebody else if they 4 can't. So I'll get a quote.

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CHAIRMAN McCUSKER: So we might just put 5 a plug number in there, Dan, as we think about approving the budget.

I do want to discuss, as a board, the 8 whole marketing conversation. What Dan has pencilled in here is basically \$120,000. Our budget pre-COVID was 400.

That did not include what we call the 12 major events. There are five of them. The Arizona 13 Bowl is one of those, DUSK, El Tour de Tucson, the jazz festival, and Second Saturday. 15

I'm assuming, given the comments 16 Mr. Sheafe made, that we're really not ready to open 17 the doors back up, acknowledging we can support those external projects until we have a little more 19 comfort. 20

And I guess that would be the same comment I would make about the marketing budget in general. But those are, I think, open for board discussion.

MR. SHEAFE: I think until we get to the

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would go into, maybe. 1 MR. MEYERS: 36. 2

MR. SHEAFE: Well, there's one other 3 thing I want to draw your attention to. We have --I want to make sure we're accurate on this, but we have nothing in there for the Arizona Bowl, and I 7 think --

CHAIRMAN McCUSKER: Well, we have nothing in there for marketing, and I want to come back to that, both Line Item 20 and then the whole marketing conversation, because we've deferred, you know, several hundred thousand dollars of projects.

So if there's -- I don't know if we have an estimate, Brandi, and what it would cost to provide the level of security at Sunshine Mile you would be comfortable with, but I think we should put some number in there for that. I don't know what that is, 50 grand, something along those lines.

18 MS. HAGA-BLACKMAN: Right now we have every day, twice a day, they rotate the hours every 20 day so that they're not coming back at the same 21 hours. But it's really the overnight where we're 22 seeing the issues so --

CHAIRMAN McCUSKER: What do you think it 24 would cost for you to step that up?

point we're at least not projecting a negative, we really ought to be cautious about making commitments out there to other events in the general marketing budget. 4

We've been able (inaudible) a little bit of money in, you know, just like we did with the street parking and the fencing and whatnot.

But to take on some bigger event -- and you really can't do one without doing the whole group, so we just need to buy ourselves more time, tell everybody we're not ready yet.

We've got to make up for some deficits, and things are looking much better, but we're not in a position where we can begin accepting new obligations.

CHAIRMAN McCUSKER: I'm okay with that. Jannie? Edmond? Are you okay with that? MR. MARQUEZ: I was surprised to see the 120 in there, happy, though. I mean, it's great that we're able to attract some events downtown, especially those that are generating sales tax, which is so needed right now.

I'm with Chris, though. I mean, we're -it gives me a rash to see that we're negative 2.5 million. I get it. Thank god we have cash on

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hand right now. But I'm -- I agree, we should not

be extending into the bigger projects right now. 2

MS. COX: And I totally agree as well. 3

I'm hoping things will change throughout the years and we'll be able to loosen it up.

But for starting out, I would say, no, we

6 need to hold our ground. 7

MR. MEYERS: This is Dan. I agree with 8

Chris. I think we need to see how the next

three months come in and see if we're seeing more of 10

an improvement that I'm projecting here. 11

And then I think we can revisit the 12 marketing thing. And the other thing I --13

CHAIRMAN McCUSKER: It may be more like 14 six months, too, Dan, because, you know, the 15 entertainment venues really don't get going until 16

17 And then not only do they produce a lot 18 of revenue; they produce a lot of pedestrian 19 20 traffic.

So I'm not sure we're going -- I mean, we can agree to look at it in 90 days. But, you know,

I think -- I think we need to be really cautious

through the end of the calendar year. 24

MR. MEYERS: Well, you know, we will. We

could do it effective immediately.

What's the board's pleasure on salaries? 2

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MR. SHEAFE: I think we follow the 3

4 protocol, and let's -- I think we -- it's just like

the improvements to the office. You know, we can

figure out a way to get that in there. 6

7 So let's just go ahead and get it and activate it at the beginning of our fiscal year. 8

CHAIRMAN McCUSKER: The State raise is 9 3 percent. We typically match them, so --10

MR. SHEAFE: That's a good base number, 12 and let's do that.

CHAIRMAN McCUSKER: All right. Dan, if you'll pencil that in.

MR. MEYERS: Okay.

MR. SHEAFE: The other thing that I'll suggest, if we could just focus on it for a minute, in having a little experience with this kind of

18 thing, there is no patrol system that you can buy 19

that can go by and triple or four or five times 20

recheck those buildings that will solve the problem 21 if you do not have the power to remove the people, 22

23 and that comes to the police.

So the police have to agree that if we call them and say we've got an inappropriate person

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broken into one of our buildings, that will remove

will watch the next three months, and, clearly, I report to you guys every single month on what we're

3 doing.

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But if I -- if I sense that we see the 4

base numbers creeping up higher than, you know,

6 we're expecting, then, you know, maybe we can address it. 7

And the other thing I wanted to make sure you guys -- remind you guys of is that we're awfully lucky we had that \$5 million sitting aside for the money we borrowed from the banks, because, don't

forget, I think we paid almost four and a half 12 million dollars of debt service. 13

CHAIRMAN McCUSKER: That was really our 14 reserves. That's what created the reserves. It's almost dollar for dollar what's currently left in 16

reserves. Had we not been able to tap into that, we would be broke. We would be dead broke.

(Various voices speaking.)

CHAIRMAN McCUSKER: And then I had this 21

same kind of thought about staff raises. There's 22 23 nobody that deserves a raise more than our staff.

You know, maybe we -- you could do that 24 effective January 1st. It's not a lot of money. We 2 them

CHAIRMAN McCUSKER: And that's not 3 happening. I mean, I think the -- you know, the police count is down about 900 officers.

They're not taking what they call 6 7 nonthreatening calls, you know, so that's part of

the problem. 8 9 They may not, Chris, respond to that. I'll talk to the chief to see if, you know, we can 10

maybe increase their patrols there or at least get them to respond if we have a break-in or vagrancy

kind of issue. But, you know, we're not the only

ones in town dealing with the police shortage. 14

MR. MARQUEZ: Hey, Brandi, are these 15 properties -- are they well lit at night, or are 16 they dark? 17

MS. HAGA-BLACKMAN: Well, we put up 18 19 lights, and they took them down.

CHAIRMAN McCUSKER: The whole street is 20 dark. I don't know if you've driven down Broadway 21 at night, but it's really dark. None of the 23 streetlights are working. And, you know, that's

part of the problem.

MS. HAGA-BLACKMAN: It's at night, and

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Page 41 1 they're doing everything at night. They're breaking 2 down the wood that's over the doors and the windows almost every week, it seems like, and we're paying for somebody to come back and reboard them as best as they can. But it's -- the graffiti has gotten 6 really bad. The graffiti (inaudible). It's really bad. It's -- it's to the point where you need 9 somebody there --CHAIRMAN McCUSKER: What about cameras? 10 Are we catching any of this on camera? 11

12 MS. HAGA-BLACKMAN: We don't have --

MR. MARQUEZ: With cameras, you just get 13 14 to watch them do it.

MS. HAGA-BLACKMAN: We don't have any 15 cameras over there --16

(Various voices speaking.) 17

CHAIRMAN McCUSKER: Well, I mean, we 18 might be able to ID somebody. 19

MR. MARQUEZ: So the commercial 20 properties I own, as soon as I lit them well, 21 everything stopped as soon as I lit them. So we might want to get those lights back up, get them higher up on the building. 24 25 (Various voices speaking.)

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1 CHAIRMAN McCUSKER: All right. So if we 2 go back through the budget, Dan, I think we added some staff raises. We're going to put some money in there for Sunshine Mile security and preventative measures. We're going to defer the marketing and

major event sponsorships. 6 7 **MR. MEYERS:** Should I leave the 120 I've

8 got in there for --CHAIRMAN McCUSKER: Yeah, leave that in

9 there, right --10

MR. MEYERS: Okay. 11

CHAIRMAN McCUSKER: -- everybody? 12 13

I think we're --

MR. SHEAFE: We've agreed to that, and 14 we've built it into the system, so we'll live with 15 it. 16

MR. MEYERS: Okay. 17

> **CHAIRMAN McCUSKER:** Anything else on the budget?

MR. MEYERS: I'm going to verify the 100 South Church number.

MS. COX: Yeah. 22

CHAIRMAN McCUSKER: Yeah, I think it's a 23 smaller number than that. The good news is, it would come down so we could improve the budget. And

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MR. SHEAFE: (Inaudible) and we can get the lights on them, and then we could have -- you know, and we might have to spend a little bit of money, and the second system would activate when somebody triggers it and go on for 15 minutes or something where the lights are flashing, and it's just flat out uncomfortable to be standing there. It doesn't defer everything, and we'll 8 have to see. I would rather invest the money that way than in more patrols, because somebody comes by 10 and they see it's been broken into, the patrols are

not going to interfere. 12 And if the police won't react, they're 13 just going to say -- make a note of it in their 14 chart and drive off. 15

CHAIRMAN McCUSKER: Let's maybe create a footnote or something to the budget that gives

Brandi and Dan some authority to intensify the prevention measures over there. We got to own 19

those at least for -- we could own them for the 20

whole year. 21

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MS. HAGA-BLACKMAN: I'll send you guys an 22 e-mail with what we've done so far and the issues

that we may have with lighting and how much it may take money-wise.

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I think a review in 90 days is really a good idea.

MR. MEYERS: Okay. Yeah. 2

CHAIRMAN McCUSKER: If someone wants to 3 move approval of the budget with those changes? 4

MS. COX: So moved.

6 MR. MARQUEZ: Second.

7 CHAIRMAN McCUSKER: Brandi, let's call 8 the roll.

9 MS. HAGA-BLACKMAN: Edmund Marquez? MR. MARQUEZ: Aye. 10
